

PI Participates in PHS Community Transition Fair



On Wednesday, May 29, 2013, the Person High School Exceptional Children's Program sponsored a Community Transition Fair for the students in the Special Education Program, thus demonstrating both elements in their program.


The fair, organized by Person High School Special Education Teachers Will Paul and Ashley Clayton, was arranged in response to the many questions and inquiries from their students and family members of services and programs available to











them when they transition from high school. Many wanted to know what is available in their own

community to assist them in being independent wage earners or what college or university options are out there for those with intellectual disabilities who could, with assistance, successfully earn a four year degree. All those questions were answered at the fair that proved to be a gathering of service providers from within Person County and from other parts of the state. (See "Resources" Box.)

Person Industries was among the local service providers represented at the Transition Fair. PI staff members Wanda Rogers, Becky Clayton, Melissa Brann and Tina Wilkerson were on hand to highlight the services and job opportunities offered through PI.

Be Safe During the Summer!

With summer approaching, things to keep in mind about the warmer months is that you are more susceptible to dehydration, sunburns, heat exhaustion and bug bites. Here are a few tips:

Sun—Tips to keep you safe and healthy this summer is to use sun screen when you're exposed to direct sunlight and wear protective clothing and hats. These items can protect you from sunburn which can be damaging to your skin.

tion—Protect yourself from dehydration and heat exhaustion. The first warning sign is usually thirst but can also be a loss of appetite, dry or flushed skin, dark colored urine, dry mouth, fatigue, chills and lightheadedness. Don't let it get to this point. Be sure to drink plenty of liquids and take breaks from the heat.

Bug Bites—As temperatures

begin to rise, so does the insect population, some of which carry disease. To minimize your risk, don't wear perfume or scented bug spray. Many fragrances mimic the smell of flowers which of course attracts bugs.

Also, keep your yard clean. Standing water can be inviting for mosquitos. Empty anything like buckets, fountains and bird baths often. Removing debris and leaves can also help eliminate hiding spots.

The big day is almost here for two PCRC employees—Steve Jackson and Tyler Pleasant. Both are graduating from high school on Saturday, June 8, 2013. Graduation is a big deal for all students and their families but especially so for these two as they also graduate from the Occupational Course of Study (OCS) Program.

The OCS is a program offered at Person High School to give students the opportunity to earn a diploma by accruing actual work hours as opposed to the traditional academic testing and completion of coursework. While the students in the program do complete class work, a great emphasis is placed on real work experience. To achieve the occupation-

al diploma, a student must also work 900 hours. That breaks down to 300 hours of school based training where the students work in enterprises within each classroom, 240 hours of community based training at community work sites to learn skills and 360 hours of competitive work wherein they must earn money.

Thanks to their employment at the Person County Recycling Center (PCRC) Steve and Tyler have both met the hour requirements and are very ready to graduate. Steve, aka "Bubba" says he enjoys working with recycling and wants to continue working at PCRC and get his driver's license. Tyler has expressed an interest in working at Eaton Corporation through the PI contract.

Both young men have done a phenomenal job at PCRC during their nine month school year, working their required hours and at every other available opportunity. Congratulations for all your hard work!
